



Walk along the paths of the ancient Koknese park

The stone castle in Koknese was built more than

800 years ago and stands as a witness to ancient historical events. It was blown up in 1701. In the 1960s, the landscape of the castle ruins was transformed. The vast waters of the hydroelectric power station built in Aizkraukle began to flood the area, submerging the hill and partially surrounding the ruins that once stood high above the river.





17th century and were commonly used in burials during that time. Cannons are displayed nearby they sank into the Daugava river after the castle was blown up and were retrieved during a dry summer 167 years later, in 1868



A spot especially suited for those who enjoy scenic views – a place to pause for a moment and watch where the Perse river flows into the Daugava river, by the mighty castle ruins, while imagining the sound of the once-rushing Perse waterfall nearby.

(7) The paths of the park converge at newly reshaped dolomite stairs. They invite visitors to descend to a viewing platform and take in the sight of the medieval castle ruins proudly rising above the waters of the Perse river. The stairway once continued down into the deep ravine, leading to the "Faun's Head", with paths stretching further toward th Perse Waterfall.




An approximately 30-meter-deep water level now conceals the former ravine, where the Perse waterfall once roared and cascaded over dolomite cliffs. The lost beauty

remains preserved in the heart through the stone-carved figure of the "Perse Girl", which can be found on the riverbank. (Author: J. Zihmanis)




